# **Non-Injectable Drugs**

### **OXYGEN**

A portable source of oxygen (E cylinder) is the primary emergency agent along with the ability to administer oxygen by positive pressure (bag-valve-mask) if necessary.

# Nitrates

Primarily a venodilator

#### **INDICATION:**

Angina pectoris Prehospital chest pain

#### **DOSAGE:**

Nitroglycerin tablet 0.3 – 0.4 mg. sublingual Sublingual absorption Nitroglycerin aerosol spray 400 mcg/spray Mucous membrane absorption

WARNINGS: Do not administer if systolic BP is not > 90 mg Hg. Do not use if erectile dysfunction drug usage within 24 hours.

# Albuterol

A bronchodilator

#### **INDICATION:**

Asthma Allergic reaction Bronchospasm

### DOSAGE: 1-2 puffs from Metered Dose Inhaler (90 mcg / puff)

#### Glucose

Hyperglycemic agent

INDICATION: Hypoglycemia

FORM: Soda (not diet); Sugar; Candy



## Aspirin

Antiplatelet drug

#### INDICATION:

Myocardial infarction Prehospital chest pain

### DOSAGE:

160 – 325 mg. non-enteric, or 4 x 81 mg tablets

### CHEWED AND SWALLOWED

WARNINGS: Patients allergic to aspirin. Patients with active peptic ulcer.

### Ammonia

General arousal agent

### **INDICATION:**

Neurocardiogenic syncope (vasovagal syncope) Use only after proper positioning of patient Supine position with legs elevated

#### DOSAGE:

Crush ampule (white-colored) and place beneath patient's nose

Do not confuse with amyl nitrite ampule (yellow-colored)

The emergency drugs shown here should be a part of every dentist's emergency kit and can be given with the understanding that their proper use most likely will neither aggravate the emergency nor result in further deterioration of the patient's condition.

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# **Injectable Drugs**

Intramuscular drug administration for general dentists with no expertise in procuring IV access

# Epinephrine

Vasoconstrictor and bronchodilator

INDICATION: Severe Bronchospasm unrelieved by inhaled albuterol

## **DOSAGE:**

ADULTS - 0.3 MG. 0.3 ml. of a 1:1,000 (1 mg./ml.) solution IM Adult Auto-Injector (e.g. Epi-Pen®)

CHILDREN - 0.15 MG. 0.15 ml. of a 1:1,000 (1 mg./ml.) solution IM Auto-Injector (e.g. Epi-Pen Jr. ®) Auto-injector Diphenhydramine

Histamine antagonist

## **INDICATION:**

Mild Allergic Reaction No respiratory / CV involvement Anaphylaxis – Second drug after epinephrine

# DOSAGE:

50 MG. IM (May also give as a 50 mg. tablet orally – 25 mg. for children)

WARNING: Caution patient of sedative effects.



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
